

A Word from our President:

I have recently had the opportunity to be a docent at both the Heritage House and Caster Cabin. As I have mentioned to some of you, although I am usually okay with speaking in front of a group, I always feel insecure at first. Especially when it is a new experience, or I don't feel like I am an expert on the topic. The worst part is that I am afraid I will get asked a question I don't know the answer to.

I knew I had to overcome my fear. When it came to the Heritage House, I decided that Mary's Playhouse seemed manageable. The back bedroom or the kitchen would have been my next choice. I found that if I read through the one-page document about the playhouse right before I led the guests outside the information would still be fresh in my mind and I would be able to talk conversationally without looking at my paper. I also decided that if I didn't know an answer to a question I would simply say, "You know, I'm not sure, let's ask that when we go back in the house to see if one of the other docents may know." Happily, I have only had to use that phrase once so far and as a result I feel my docent experience was successful.

With Caster Cabin I read the Historical Marker in front of the building and followed Jan Hart around for a tour and I was good to go.

Did I make some mistakes? Sure, I did, but the historical police did not come arrest me and most of our visitors didn't seem to notice. They just seemed to be curious to see what the cabin looked like on the inside.

After my docent experience, I thought I would look up what job responsibilities of other historical docents.

Additionally, I looked at job postings for docent/tour guides at the National Museum of American History, USS Missouri Memorial, the Meadowcroft Rock Shelter and the Historic Village in Pennsylvania, as well as for a Visitor Experience Volunteer with the Edward M. Kennedy Institute for the United States Senate.

What do all these positions have in common?

1. They don't pay very well.
2. The minimum requirement is sometimes a high school education, but even that is not always required.
3. They are expected to greet and/or assist visitors and be friendly.
4. Provide tours as needed.
5. Have an interest in history.

Nowhere does it say you have to know everything, which just goes to show that we can all be volunteer docents.

One other note, being a docent does not mean you have to stand for hours on end. Providing a one room tour at the Heritage House, Mary's playhouse, the Depot or Caster Cabin takes very little time and there is a place to sit at each venue in between tours.

Please call Cynthia Sharp, Mary Higbie or me and let us know you are willing to help with docent activities 2-3 times a year. WE NEED YOU! Your help will be greatly appreciated.

303 S. O'Connor Road, Irving

The Heritage House is a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark and was built in 1912. Tour admission as well as participation in the Quilt of Valor project are free and open to the public.

"Quilt of Valor" display and gathering of signed quilt blocks. Guests may sign quilt blocks with their name and/or message to the military. The blocks will become part of the next Quilt of Valor created by the Irving Quilt Guild. This national project involves the creation of quilts to honor and comfort our physically and mentally wounded service men and women in all branches, both active and retired. Visitors will also be able to tour Mary's Playhouse in the back-garden area. Originally built as a chicken coop, it was adapted as a playhouse for the young Schulze children in the 1920's.
