11TH ANNUAL CELEBRATING IRVING

Takes place, as always, in April. This year we are highlighting the life and works of American artist Grant Wood. Co-founder of Irving, J.O. Schulze, was from Iowa and returned to Iowa shortly after the founding of our city. Grant Wood painted scenes of his home state of Iowa and nothing quite says "Iowa" like his famous American Gothic painting and other rural scenes.

Among the many events will be the Tableaux Vivants on Saturday, April 7 at 7 p.m. These are "living pictures" of some of the works of Grant Wood presented at the Singley Academy by theater and art students. Admission is free so plan to join us for this unique presentation. Some special door prizes are planned.

There is a full calendar of activities so be sure to check out all the events. Little is known about Grant Wood's Memorial Window in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, but this 25 foot tall stained glass window is magnificent. Original drawings for the window by Grant Wood will be on display at the Irving Arts Center Dupree Lobby April 7 – July 1 along with works by Wood and other regional artists. All events are free to attend.


