Are you ready for fall? I am looking forward to cooler weather and the brilliance of the trees changing colors. Moreover, I am looking


forward to continuing the legacy of the Irving Heritage Society (IHS) with great programming and membership engagement. Together, we can build upon the success of the past leadership.

FUN FACTS ABOUT IRVING!

DFW Airport opened to commercial air traffic in January 1974 helping to transform Irving into an international business and transportation hub.

Otis Brown and his son Lynn Brown were the only father and son duo to serve as mayors of Irving. Otis Brown was Irving's first mayor elected in 1914. Lynn Brown served three terms as Irving's mayor from 1959-1967.

Irving has had three city hall buildings. The first was built in 1932; the second in 1956; and the current building dedicated in 1976.

The recently torn down Plymouth Park Shopping Center opened its first phase in 1955.

Sixth Street was once known as Kit – Lone Star Road because it led from Irving to the community of Kit and the Lone Star gas pipeline ran along the road's route.

The residents of Irving formed a volunteer fire department in 1921. The city hired its first fire fighter in 1953. The city hired its first full-time employee, a City Secretary whose primary job was to collect taxes, in 1939.
